



75th Street Corridor Improvement Project Phases II/III Public Open House #1 Summary October 30, 2019

On Wednesday, October 30, 2019, the CREATE Program partners, hosted the first public open house for the 75^{th} Street Corridor Improvement Project (75^{th} St. CIP) for Phases II/III. The open house took place at Freedom Temple Church of God in Christ, 1459 W 74^{th} St, Chicago, Illinois, from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m.

Open House Promotion

The 75th St. CIP project team engaged in numerous outreach initiatives to promote the open house starting in early September. The project team handed out open house flyers at the 79th Street Renaissance Festival on September 7 and 8 and September 10 Community Advisory Group meeting. Electronic copies of the open house flyer were sent to project area elected officials, members of the project's Community Advisory Group, project stakeholders and the CREATE Program's newsletter and announcements listserv. Open house flyers were also distributed at project area schools, parks, aldermanic offices and places of worship.

Additionally, a project team representative spoke about the project and open house on-air on 95.1 FM and WVON radio stations. Advertisements for the open house were posted in the *Chicago Sun Times*, *Southwest Herald*, *Chicago Citizen* and Metra's *On The Bi-Level* October newsletter. The event was promoted on the CREATE Program's Facebook page, the CREATE website and the 75th St. CIP website.

Eighty-seven members of the public signed in at the open house along with two members of the media. Thirty-two members of the 75th St. CIP project team attended the open house to share information about the project with the public. One elected official and an invited exhibitor attended as well.

The attendees primarily consisted of residents from the communities near the project area (Ashburn, Englewood, Auburn Gresham and West Chatham) and individuals interested in employment opportunities associated with the 75th St. CIP. Additional attendees included small business owners and congregants from nearby churches.

Sixty-three of the eighty-seven people who signed in reported how they learned about the meeting. Sixteen learned of the event through the radio, thirteen through email, nine by family/friends, seven through Dawson Technical Institute, six by aldermanic communication, and two through newspapers. Facebook, block club event, a flyer, "CBA," Congressman's office, internet, communication from CREATE Program/IDOT, word of mouth, Phase II designer and a letter were each listed once as ways people heard about the event. Twentynine attendees provide no information on how they learned about the meeting.

Open House

Upon entering the meeting space, attendees were welcomed and asked to sign in. Attendees were then invited to view a twenty-minute pre-recorded presentation on loop in an adjacent meeting room or enter the main room to view exhibit boards and talk to project team staff. The presentation covered a brief CREATE Program overview, 75th St. CIP components, community benefits from the project and stakeholder involvement on the project. In the main room, attendees were directed towards a table where they could obtain project handouts.

In addition to the exhibit boards and handouts, four staffed stations with additional handouts and information were set up in the main room. At the first station, Michael Harris, Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT), answered inquiries about property acquisition and provided handouts on the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Act. At another, Lisa Cockerham, Director of IDOT's Highway Construction Careers Training

Program (HCCTP) at Dawson Technical Institute provided information and handouts about the program. Twenty-seven individuals signed up to receive additional information about HCCTP at the table. Metra staffed a third station and shared handouts and information about the nearby Auburn Park station.

At the final station, the project team invited attendees to provide their input on potential community mobility improvement by taking a survey. The survey could be completed online during the open house on one of four laptops available or by returning a pre-printed survey. Four online surveys were completed during the open house and no hard copy surveys were returned during the meeting. Tables were also set aside for attendees to complete and return comment forms and a form to indicate their interest in joining the Community Advisory Group for the project. Twelve Community Advisory Group interest forms, ten comment forms and two resumes were received.


Meeting Comments

- Muralist seeking to partner with program to develop mural on project area viaduct
- Interest in outreach and construction elements of project
- Request for the project to integrate innovative and holistic travel and community solutions
- Interest in hiring process
- Request for project and workforce outreach to smaller churches in the community
